

## **FLOOD WARNING**

The story of Noah, the flood and the ark, is well known. Famous for his boat building, zoo keeping and weather forecasting, Noah is also a figure who challenges us to think about our relationship with God and what we believe about natural disasters.

Noah was described as a man who “walked with God”. It seems to imply an intimacy with God. Noah being picked out as the person God chose to save, in order not to destroy humanity completely, backs this up.

Noah was given warning of the flood. Recently there have been other floods of which there has been little or no warning. People ask questions about God allowing such disasters and about God initiating them in judgement. I think it is clear that floods and earthquakes and natural disaster are not God’s acts of judgement. On the one hand they are not specific enough and on the other they are not general or catastrophic enough. Neither do I think it is a question of whether God “allows” them.

Floods and other natural disasters can be seen as a warning. They are a warning about the power of the natural created order. They are also a warning about the fragility of creation – including human life. Floods, such as we saw in the north of England last autumn and now in other parts of the world, extend this warning to the ways in which human actions affect the fragile balance of creation.

## ALL WE CAN

Cherkos, our partner project in Ethiopia, is changing. Adheno (which means “Good News” in the local language) the local organisation supported by All We Can, is bringing about positive change in the lives of marginalised people. In Cherkos rapidly changing climate has meant that farming families are not able to grow as many crops as they used to and the yield is reduced to a third of that produced a generation ago.

Adheno is providing farmers with potato seeds and training in improved farming techniques. This variety of potato is specially adapted to the soil and micro-climate of Cherkos and, if stored well, will last through the months when there is no other food thus plugging the “hunger gap”. The potatoes are used to make a sauce to go with the local flat bread. Farmers are also helped to grow vegetables using seeds adapted to the soil and climate conditions, so that people have a more nutritious and diverse diet.

So the “super spud” is providing a more sustainable and reliable food source. If the farmers can grow more than their families need, they are able to sell the surplus and have income to use for the children’s education as well as medical and housing needs.

## Prayer Focus

The months of December and January are a very busy time in the Christian calendar when we celebrate all of the events surrounding the birth of Christ.

Essentially, we cover the first 30 years of Christ's life in six or seven weeks and then on 26<sup>th</sup> February we celebrate Ash Wednesday which marks the start of the period of Lent. So perhaps now is a good time to reflect on the events of the last few weeks and what they mean to us. We certainly know how, where and when these events occurred but do we know why? As Christians we believe that God cared so much for each and every one of us that that He took on the form of humankind, and lived as one of us on earth, facing all its temptations and problems, suffering a death on the cross in order that we might share with Him in God's kingdom both now and in the hereafter.

This relationship with Jesus is a very personal one and changes with our changing circumstances. God knows and shares all aspects of our lives, our joys and sorrows, our worries, every part of our lives even those parts we would prefer to remain secret. So we should reflect on what Christ has done for us; it will be different for each one of us. This is the news we should share with others, both believers and non-believers. We do not know what Christ will do for others, but we know what Jesus has done for us and the difference it has made to our lives, which we can show by the way we live our lives, our actions and our words. The great thing is that even though we will make a mess of things, we are forgiven and can start again. So we pray thanking God for all the blessings we have received and asking that we should be given the opportunity to share these with others.

As mentioned earlier, Lent starts on 26<sup>th</sup> February, leading to Good Friday on 10<sup>th</sup> April. Pray that we all come to realise the very personal nature of Christ's passion, that He died for you and me. How does this affect the way we live, and how can we share this good news with

others? Pray for the courage and strength to share the Gospel with others whenever we can, both in our words and actions.

Pray for the staff of our circuit, especially our own minister, as they take on additional responsibilities. Pray for Andrew Wood as he recovers from illness and takes on his new role.


Pray for the lonely and the sick and for those who care for them.


# AGM

## Circuit staffing update

## Circuit staffing update

Possibly you will be aware of the sudden illness of the Chair of the Southampton District, Rev Canon Dr Andrew Wood. He is recovering, but it will take some time. This has affected the previously-announced changes to our circuit staffing. The roles of our Superintendent and Minister have changed from 1<sup>st</sup> January instead of the proposed 1<sup>st</sup> March.

Therefore, Rev Andrew de Ville is now the Chair of District, and Rev David Muskett is now Superintendent of our Circuit. Andrew Wood will be full-time Head of Ministries in Methodist HQ when he has fully recovered.

David will continue to have pastoral oversight of Liphook and Midhurst churches, and until September Haslemere will be looked after by Rev John Illsley, a supernumerary minister in our Circuit.

A District service of farewell for Andrew Wood and welcome & induction for Andrew de Ville will be held at Chandlers Ford Church on **Saturday 29<sup>th</sup> February at 2pm**. The Chairman's secretary would like to know if you will be attending. Details are on the noticeboard in the Church.

## **GOD IN LOVE UNITES US**

'God in Love Unites Us' is a report that makes a number of radical proposals which will be voted on at Methodist Conference when it meets at the Telford International Centre between 25<sup>th</sup> June and 2<sup>nd</sup> July.

The proposals include allowing churches to hold same-sex weddings and events to bless unmarried cohabiting couples, essentially overturning the requirement for celibacy. It also suggests that a new liturgy be drawn up to offer prayers for married couples who are getting divorced.

You won't be surprised that within the Church there are some who strongly object and urge the church to retain its traditional understanding of marriage and sexuality. Methodist Evangelicals together - MET - have published a booklet 'Remaining Faithful'. Another group, Dignity and Worth, have published a booklet 'The Case for Change'. In this short article I do not attempt to outline all that is in these books and in the primary document 'God in Love Unites Us'.

The report will guide conference and, if agreed, includes all the changes that will be necessary to the Methodist Constitutional Practice and Discipline and what are called Standing Orders.

This is really a big issue for the church following years of lively discussion. I myself as a District Social Responsibility Secretary went to many churches in 1990/91 to share the findings of a 'commission' which presented to Methodist Conference a report on human sexuality. The commission was 'prevented from offering agreed recommendations regarding lifestyle and Church discipline by the presence of a variety of sincerely-held views among its members'. Since then there has been what has been called a Pilgrimage of Faith as the church has grappled with contradictory convictions.

The Marriage and Relationships Task Group has produced 'God in Love Unites Us' and consists of people who hold contradictory views. It is the fruit of their openness to one another, despite disagreements along the way. What they bring to Conference is a result of their

growing desire to share both the love and the joy of God as disciples together. They offer to you, me and the rest of the Methodist Church the fruits of their conversation. There will be opportunity for you to share your thoughts with members of other circuit churches. <sup>(2)</sup>

Writing in The Sunday Times, the President of the Methodist Conference Rev Dr Barbara Glasson said that these issues were "complicated", but that Methodists could "disagree well" and continue to be united in love. The Methodist Church need not split over the issues of gender, sexuality and gay marriage, the President suggested.

Certainly, The Methodist Church has worked hard as a body of Christians to live with contradictory convictions on this and other issues. The challenge, whatever the outcome of Conference in June, is to be as John Wesley said 'of one heart, though we are not of one opinion'. 'Though we cannot think alike, may we not love alike?' <sup>(3)</sup>

That's a challenge for all of us despite, I anticipate, us holding differing opinions in matters of relationship and sexuality

We are encouraged to reflect on the difficulties and unrest that have plagued their country over many years.


They share the challenges they have met and the hopes they have for the future. They invite us to support them as they continue their often-turbulent journey towards full reconciliation.

## A Million Tiny Acts

You may remember Rory Stewart, who was a contender for the Tory leadership. A lot of water has gone under the bridge since then but he contributed an excellent article to the 'i' Newspaper on Saturday 21<sup>st</sup> December which I thought could have been written for anyone who has felt let down by the politicians.

Rory said that "we can only begin to repair this broken structure by returning to the foundations of our society. It is at that local level of our towns and cities that politics is genuinely intimate [and] relevant to our most pressing needs. It is at that level that citizens have the most relevant knowledge, where we can show that we know what it takes to make things better."

"None of this is about an individual. A more effective politics is not about what any single person can do; it is the sum of a million tiny acts. Within our communities we know [not only] what needs to be changed but also where we need help - we must become more active as citizens. It is that involvement which will give us the knowledge to choose the right leaders"

During the Queen's Speech on Christmas Day the Queen said something similar to this when she said that "we all need to take many small steps to make a world of difference".




