

CHRISTMAS 2021

Christmas Carols are songs that tell the story of the birth of Jesus. Usually, they add to the biblical narrative. Some add detail through poetic licence: winter snow or the time of night or the animals that may (or may not) have shared a stable with the Holy Family. Others add theology as a kind of musical and poetic commentary or interpretation of the biblical texts.

Most echo some of what the Bible stories tell us. All echo the purpose behind retelling the story of one baby's birth 2000 years ago in a small Middle Eastern town. That single event, unremarkable in many ways, is the most remembered birth in history because it spells out so much more than a single birth.

The one word that sums up what Christmas is about is 'hope'

Any baby can be a sign of hope; many hopes are attached to the birth of babies; but this baby carries the hopes of more than his parents and those of the next generation. This baby signals that there is hope for the world, for humanity – even for us 2000 years later.

That God became a human being in Palestine 2000 years ago means there is hope; there was hope then and there is hope now. And that hope is echoed in the song of the angels which in turn is echoed in the songs of Christmas now. Read again and think on the words of *It Came Upon the Midnight Clear*:

- 1 It came upon the midnight clear,
that glorious song of old,
from angels bending near the earth
to touch their harps of gold:
'Peace on the earth, good will to men,
from heaven's all-gracious King!'
The world in solemn stillness lay
to hear the angels sing.

- 2 Still through the cloven skies they come,
with peaceful wings unfurled ;
and still their heavenly music floats
o'er all the weary world ;
above its sad and lowly plains
they bend on hovering wing ;
and ever o'er its Babel sounds
the blessed angels sing.
- 3 Yet with the woes of sin and strife
the world has suffered long ;
beneath the angel strain have rolled
two thousand years of wrong ;
and man, at war with man, hears not
the love-song which they bring.
O hush the noise, ye men of strife,
and hear the angels sing !
- 4 For lo, the days are hastening on,
to prophets shown of old,
when with the ever-circling years
shall come the time foretold,
when the new heaven and earth shall own
the Prince of Peace their King,
and all the world repeat the song
which now the angels sing.

9th January at 10am – Covenant Service with Rev David Muskett





Church Christmas Card

All We Can

At the Harvest Festival in October the envelope collection for All We Can, with Gift Aid included, came to £288.75.

The money will go to help a rural community in Zimbabwe take more steps to cope with COVID and climate change.

HEFO, the All We Can local partner, is working with the community to ensure a supply of clean water for cooking, drinking and hand washing. It is vital that the women and girls do not have too far to walk to obtain water. Bore holes are being cleaned out and sanitation improved; the importance of handwashing is being taught to prevent the spread of the virus.

Climate change causes endless problems. The people rely on the crops they grow as their main source of food. If they can grow more than their family needs they can sell the excess in the market and so have an income to pay for education, medical needs, basic tools, clothes and household items.

HEFO is showing people how to protect their land from flooding by building small walls and digging drainage ditches. Similar ditches are used for irrigation in times of drought. They receive seeds for crops which are better suited to the changing climate and are more nutritious and also taught how to make compost to enrich the soil.

Some of the farmers who have already learned new skills from HEFO are now being helped to diversify by learning how to look after-and breed, animals such as chickens and goats.

A GREENER VISION FOR MIDHURST

There are plans in place to make the town greener and more vibrant with better provision for pedestrians and cyclists as well as improved planting and signage.

This project, set up by the Midhurst Vision Partnership and headed by Phillipa Mc Cullough, has the support of Midhurst Town Council, West Sussex County Council, Chichester District Council and the South Downs National Park.

In 2008 there were plans to improve various aspects of the town and the Market Square was repaved. That was all then but now a design template for the town centre has been created and plans include planting, hard landscaping, signs and street furniture which will be attractive and cohesive throughout the town.

The first phase will focus on creating a pedestrian - friendly route from the Grange Car Park to North Street. The shopping areas of Bepton Road (near Sainsbury's) and Grange Road will be included.

Design work will be done in stages and will take time and further fund-raising will be needed to continue and complete the scheme.

As part of the project some valuable work for wheelchair users and the disabled has been done by our own John Sumner who, with Nicky Harris, toured the town and plotted places that needed improvement.

There is still much to do and some of the ideas emerging were from former projects eg the improvement of finger posts (direction signs) will, for the first time, include a finger pointing to Midhurst Methodist Church!

COP26 and GREENWASHING



In our October/November newsletter I wrote about Runnymede and compared Greta Thunberg and Extinction rebellion with the Suffragettes saying that there would be some statues of her put up in the future. I am pleased to report that there is a statue of her in Winchester now. You can Google it.

Ms Thunberg has been in the news recently because she travelled to the Cop 26 summit in Glasgow and strongly criticised world leaders, calling the conference a "Greenwash Festival".

Greenwashing is a word that has been used a lot recently and it is something which is a very serious hindrance to saving our planet from global warming. Greenwashing is where a company spends time and money advertising and marketing their goods and services as being environmentally friendly when they are not! In other words, greenwashing is the act of making false or misleading claims about the environmental benefits of a product or service.

This has now gone into the world of councils and governments. They want to take our attention away from their bad environmental behaviour, so they distract us with claims of planting thousands of trees or spending more on recycling plastic. These are good things to do but they are only a fraction of what needs doing now.

Why is there a new coal mine planned in England? Why is Australia mining a massive amount of coal when they are a country suffering so much from global warming? Why are people in Scotland still digging up peat for garden fertiliser when it releases so much carbon dioxide? Why has our government lowered the tax on Domestic flights?

Let's start making decisions to act now instead of continually procrastinating. An American President once said that the most important thing for a government was "the economy stupid " but now it is not!

Racism



What did you think? ...


...when you heard the word 'Leprosy?'

Did you, like me, remember reading about it – the Leper colonies, the begging, the bells to warn when they approached, the stigma of the very word Leper? But surely that doesn't happen nowadays – there is, after all, a cure!

There is indeed a cure and has been since 1981/2 but today millions of people are still affected by Leprosy, with many still to be diagnosed (it can take on average around five years for the symptoms to develop) and even when that happens it takes six to twelve months for the drugs to work.

If I thought about it at all, I suppose regardless of the facts some part of me still assumed it was contagious but, like Covid it is spread by moisture droplets passed through the air. It is not hereditary and around 95% of people of the world are thought to be naturally immune. Education, as in so many other areas, together with clean water and good sanitation would help but there also needs to be the psychosocial support as one of the biggest barriers still to overcome is the stigma attached to the very word 'Leper'. People affected by the disease are still being subjected to discrimination and are often rejected by their families, friends and community.

The poorest communities in the world suffer most i.e., in 2020 51% of new cases diagnosed were in India



The Leprosy Mission (then known as The Mission to Lepers) was founded in 1874 by Wellesley and Alice Bailey and their first hospital opened in Purulia, West Bengal in 1888. That hospital is still one of the Leprosy Mission flagship centres today.

After nearly 150 years the work started by Wellesley and Alice continues and 'The Leprosy Mission' is recognised across the world for their excellence in the fields of leprosy, neglected tropical diseases and disability. They pioneer surgical techniques and rehabilitation programmes that transform lives.

I hope the visits of Chris Stratta (Harvest Supper) and Peter Nicholls (24th October) gave everyone food for thought.

They certainly made me wonder if perhaps we are too comfortable /complacent in our giving to the charities we support.

Do we need to open our eyes and minds and help in areas less well-publicised?

SiC worked through the pandemic lockdowns with hundreds of hours of remote support from dedicated volunteers - children's video calls, digital tech advice, food parcels, home schooling (most parents don't speak enough English for this) etc. Social events and face-to-face support have been running again for a while. Now they are facing the latest challenge; welcoming new arrivals from Afghanistan – families on the emergency Afghan Relocation Scheme are being placed in the Chichester area. If you would like to help, you can volunteer your time or donate much-needed funds. There will be more information on their website soon.

Friends Of Midhurst Common

Winter storms on Midhurst Common recently caused a partial obstruction of one of the Public Footpaths when a tree fell. This was reported to Cowdray Estate; they responded quickly and made the area safe.

A winter issue for dog walkers is fallen holly leaves which can get caught in their pads. Frightening but easily rectified.

The Cowdray Estate is at present working in The Severals, felling mature conifers and removing some rhododendron - this work will be carried out over the next few months and will extend onto Midhurst Common. On the heathland and immediate surrounding areas these trees will not be replaced as we are trying to maintain open areas of heathland habitat which is treeless.

The South Downs National Park Rangers, with a volunteer party, spent two days in October helping our own Heath Team to remove unwanted silver birch, conifers and rhododendron at the southern end of the heathland – thank you to them, as this is quite a task for us to keep up with.

The weather can make the heathland maintenance difficult at this time of year. If you would like to help with this essential work volunteer days are the last Friday of every month when we clear birch, pine and general areas of scrub. The team meets at 10am and works until around 1pm. Please contact me for details.

We are always interested to know what you see as you walk over The Common so consider sending me photographs on anything you think might be of interest especially species of plants or animals not regularly spotted.

Recently I have seen a brain or cauliflower fungus, *Sparassis crispa*; this one was about 15 inches in diameter and apparently they can grow to 24 inches! Four stonechats were also reported and of course many robins can be heard in the trees. Sparrowhawks are regulars

and look out for a white-tailed, or sea eagle, flying overhead. Three pairs

were released on the Isle of Wight in 2019 - 240 years after last recorded in the UK - and should be easy to spot as they are the largest bird of prey we have. A ginger-haired pig has been reported on the periphery of the Common - maybe an escaper or are we getting wild boar coming in from other areas of the UK?

Try to go for a walk on Midhurst Common and admire the view from Sunset Hill over the South Downs during the Christmas break.

Your regular update on our charitable fundraising efforts

At our Harvest Supper on 2nd October Chris Stratta from the Leprosy Mission spoke to us about their work and the excess of donations over costs from the Supper - £175 - went to The Leprosy Mission. £146 was also raised from Gift Aided donations. Envelopes were available a couple of weeks later when our preacher was Peter Nicholls also from the Leprosy Mission.

The annual Harvest envelope appeal for All We Can raised £240 + Gift Aid.

We provided refreshments before a memorial service in November and received a donation of £50 for Church funds.

The Autumn Sale and Coffee on 20th November was well-supported and felt like the events we enjoyed before the pandemic. We had quite a crowd which was lovely to see. On the day we raised £797 and we hope to have exceeded £800 when the final result is known. Thank you to all who supported this event and all the helpers beforehand, at the time and afterwards.

As usual we will have plenty of opportunities to support charities over the Christmas season:

. At the Gift Service on 12th December gifts of cash hung on the tree will go to Sanctuary in Chichester for their work with refugees.

. As last year there will be greeting cards for you to complete and hang on the tree. Donations in lieu of postage and cards will go to Action for Children.

. The retiring collection at the Carol Service on 17th December at 4pm will be for Stonepillow, who work with the homeless.

. There will be a collection at our Christmas Day service, for Action for Children.

The vocal quartet, Oaken Harmony, will be performing in the Church on 26th February and we will provide interval refreshments, asking for donations to Sanctuary in Chichester.
