Dear Friends,

One of my guilty pleasures back in the 1990s was to watch the irreverent TV comedy 'Father Ted' about three incompetent Catholic priests who were sent as far away as possible from where they could cause problems – the mythical remote Craggy Island, supposedly on the west coast of Ireland. Father Ted Crilly had been caught embezzling money – 'It was just resting in my account,' he claimed. Father Dougal Maguire was one bead short of a rosary and rarely understood the central beliefs and practices of the church. Father Jack Hackett had too much of a history with wine, women, and song.

One of my favourite episodes concerns the time they tried to observe Lent in as severe a way as possible, hoping to outdo Ted's nemesis, Father Dick Byrne of nearby Rugged Island. Ted gives up cigarettes, Dougal gives up rollerblading, and Jack involuntarily gives up drink when Ted hides his bottle. They call in Sister Assumpta, who wakes them at 5 am with an airhorn, subjects them to ice baths, being dragged by tractors, and other tortures. At night, they have to sleep on beds made of bricks.

Is this extreme and cartoonish? Of course, it is. But it is an exaggeration based on many people's perception of Lent as being a time of self-flagellation. So there has been a reaction against it. Instead of self-denial of fairly minor things like chocolate, increasingly I hear people saying, "I'm not giving something up for Lent, I'm taking something up." Of course, they are going to take up something positive, but in a society where we have often set aside self-denial in place of self-fulfilment, I guess it's hardly surprising.

I think we need to find a balance between the two approaches. Christianity is not self-torture, but neither is it 'me, me, me.' I think that some of the words the minister says in the Covenant Service put it admirably:

Christ has many services to be done: some are easy, others are difficult; some bring honour, others bring reproach; some are suitable to our natural inclinations and material interests, others are contrary to both; in some we may please Christ and please ourselves, in others we cannot please Christ except by denying ourselves. Yet the power to do all these things is given to us in Christ, who strengthens us.

The key is that we set out to please Christ, whatever that entails. When it involves self-denial, it hints at the Cross, and we are preparing for that during Lent. When we also please ourselves by pleasing Christ, it indicates the joy of the Resurrection.

However we mark Lent and Easter let us hold together both the Cross and the Resurrection and put a smile on the face of Jesus.

Methodist Reflections for Lent

Charles Wesley's famous hymn *Love Divine, All Loves Excelling* (*StF* 503) talks about Jesus as 'unbounded love' – a kind of love that cannot be contained, that works in our lives and in our world to free us and heal us. *Unbounded Love* is the theme of the Lent campaign of the Methodist Church in 2024 – holding together our commitments to be a justice-seeking church, and a people who experience and proclaim the good news of God's uncontainable love.

Sign up on the Methodist Website for daily reflection emails during Lent, sharing daily email reflections that explore the theme of *Unbounded Love*. Sign up to receive these each day, beginning on Wednesday 14 February and discover a rhythm of reflection over Lent. (You'll also be signed up to future reflection series.)

What to expect?

A range of resources that connect the Gospel readings from the Sunday lectionary throughout Lent to weekly themes, each one a line lifted from "Love divine, all loves excelling". The themes are:

- Week 1 "Unbounded love": Jesus' baptism and wilderness experience God's love bursts the barriers of heaven, and then bursts into the realms of darkness.
- Week 2 "Visit us with thy salvation": Losing our life (psyche) to find it – the ways we attempt to insulate ourselves from God's love.
- Week 3 "Pure and spotless let us be": Turning the tables in the Temple corporate religious attempts to boundary God's love.
- Week 4 "Finish then thy new creation": God's unbounded love for the cosmos.
- Week 5 "Changed from glory into glory": Like a seed that has to die before it bears fruit, death is no barrier to God's love.

- Week 6 "Till we cast our crowns before thee": As Jesus entered Jerusalem the people responded by taking off their cloaks. What's our equivalent?
- **Holy Week** "Lost in wonder, love, and praise!": As Jesus becomes bound by his opponents, will God's love stay bound?

Forty daily discipleship prompts, will be delivered straight to your email inbox every day of Lent, excluding Sundays. Daily emails will include Bible studies, creative activities and challenges to take an action.

Reading fiction is good for your health!

Research from the University of Sussex has found that reading fiction, even if only for just six minutes at a time, is a good way of relieving stress, lowering heart rate and reducing muscle tension.

Studies, using MRI scans, show that reading improves connectivity in the brain. Fiction is particularly good for us because we become immersed in the story and that increases our sense of well-being and empathy.

Printed books are better at relieving stress than Kindle or tablet especially in the evening as the blue light they emit hampers sleep.

Carry a book with you wherever you go as you may be stuck in a waiting room or travelling and your book will help to relieve tension, unlike scrolling down your mobile phone.

'Welcome to Britain': The Colouring Book for Hope Sanctuary in Chichester

Sanctuary in Chichester recently experienced a gesture of solidarity and support for young refugees and asylum-

seeking children, which is a testament to the power of art and community.

The Professional Cartoonists Organisation, moved by the removal of child-friendly murals at the Kent 'Intake Unit' for unaccompanied asylum-seeking children in Dover, decided to take a stand. The murals, which were ordered to be removed by the immigration minister, had been a source of comfort and welcome for the children.

Cartoonists Unite for a Cause

In response to this event, renowned cartoonists, including the likes of Quentin Blake and Terry Gilliam, came together to create a 'Welcome to Britain' colouring book. This initiative was not just about creating a book, it symbolised solidarity and a message to these young souls that they are welcomed and valued in the UK. The cartoonists generously offered their talents for free, and '38 Degrees' supported the cause by running a fundraiser to cover printing and postage costs.

Thirty copies of the book and some crayons, were donated to SiC and were distributed during one of their Drop-in sessions. These gifts were particularly cherished by the children being housed at the hotel.

2023 was not all Doom and Gloom

There **has** been some good news over the last year.

A new vaccine has been developed against malaria. It has taken ten years to trial in Africa and is called RTS, S. The vaccine reduces severe malaria by 22% and decreases toddler deaths by 13% It will eventually save tens of thousands of lives every year. Not only that but a cheaper, better vaccine for malaria called R21 is on the way.

More good news: Southampton University has made major progress towards a vaccine for respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) which is an illness which kills hundreds of children and thousands of elderly people every year. It is also one of the major causes of the common cold. This vaccine will reduce related hospital admissions by 80%. It is hoped that it will be ready by next winter.

On the home front:

Midhurst is starting to look more vibrant as two cafes in North Street which were closed have now reopened under new management.

"In Touch"

One of the big local issues is that of loneliness and isolation, and this can easily morph into anxiety and poor health.

Midhurst Community Hub is setting up a telephone buddying service called **"In Touch"** (as in "Keeping in touch") whereby some 20 volunteers drawn from Midhurst and the surrounding villages commit to making just 3 phone calls a week to people who would like to hear a friendly voice and have a chat.

Making those 3 calls a week is the only commitment and so this can be done from home on landline or mobile. But it means that 60 people a week can be contacted and benefit from a cheery voice!

There has to be some admin around this project to assure the privacy and confidentiality of both the volunteer and the person called, and so volunteers would need to:

- Complete a basic form -name, address, particular interests/circumstances to match with the client's.
- Attend a briefing session
- Sign a confidentiality form- to avoid gossip.
- Complete a DBS safeguarding form online, as many of the clients called will be vulnerable people

Appeal for new stewards

At the last Church Meeting there was an appeal for more Church Stewards and it was suggested that a description of the rôle be published so we all know what's involved:

Job description for the position of Steward

The stewards constitute the primary body for ensuring that Sunday worship happens, but in effect this is delegated to the 'Sunday Stewards'. Not all the 'Sunday Stewards' are Stewards ie members of the Leadership Team. Not all the Stewards get involved with Sunday services. The following refers to the (leadership) Stewards rather than those who supervise the Sunday services.

The Church Stewards are corporately responsible with the Minister for giving leadership and help over the whole range of the local church's life and activity. The Church Stewards are called to act upon the decisions and policies of the Church Council.

The rôle will vary according to context, cultural setting, local arrangements and ways of working. The experience, gifts and graces that a team of stewards bring will also influence how the rôles are carried out. The Standing Orders that govern church stewards provide a framework within which the role can be exercised in a way that best fits the local context and enables the work of God to be accomplished and the stewards to work within those rules.

Stewards get involved in:

. exercising pastoral care and leadership, with the minister

. communicating policies decided at Synod and Conference and acting upon them

- . acting on decisions of the Church Meeting
- . acting as Trustees, with the other members of the Church Meeting
- . keeping up-to-date with Safeguarding matters
- . communicating with preachers and sorting out Local Arrangements
- . recruiting new members of the Leadership Team when appropriate

This list is not definitive; for more information please go online for the Methodist Church Stewards' Handbook.

Does this sound like something that might suit you? If so, please speak to our minister Dave, or the stewards Tim, Sian or Alison. Our Leadership Team needs more input to make good decisions.

Quilted Prayers

In 2011 at the Haslemere Methodist Church Quilting Exhibition Barbara had the unexpected privilege of meeting Donna Rigby and friends from St. Stephen's Church, Shottermill. They explained to her about their Patchwork Prayer Ministry. Their information given with such enthusiasm inspired her to come back to Midhurst Methodist Church and talk about the possibility of starting a similar ministry.

From that small beginning the 'Quilted Prayers' started in 2012 and our first quilt was dedicated on Easter Day. Since then we have had the opportunity to offer our prayer quilts to thirty eight people. Some were members of our congregation and others, many miles away, known only to the person requesting the quilt on their behalf. We have also made two small very special quilts for two new babies born to members of our congregation.

These quilts, as many of you know, are handmade and freely given to anyone who would like to receive this comforting gift of love and prayers. Long threads are stitched at intervals through the quilt and members of the congregation are asked to tie a knot whilst saying a silent prayer for the recipient. Website Update

Well, it has been seven and a half years since we first started a web site for Midhurst Methodist Church. Over that time we have had more than 12,400 views. This year was slightly behind the last two years with

1988 views, only six less than last year, but we did have 90 more visitors in 2023 totalling 833 separate visits. These visitors came from 18 different countries but none from South America this year. After the UK and America, Canada was the third highest number of visitors, with China dropping into fourth place.

February had the most monthly views last year and November the least. Most popular day was Friday and we even had three views from Australia on Christmas day in 2023.

The Chairman of the Fundraising Team retires on 18th February, at the Annual Church Meeting. We are appealing for someone to take on this rôle and below is a summary of what's involved:

Fundraising Chair Job Description

The Funds raised by the Team at Midhurst Methodist Church are for either (1) charities specified at the time of an event or (2) for Methodist connexional funds and charitable causes or (3) for the work of our Church in the community.

There has never been a written job description for this rôle, but here are a few pointers as to what the current Chairman has been doing:

. organising sales and other events with the help of the Team, booking the hall, recruiting staff as needed and dealing with publicity; or delegating these various tasks to members of the Team or others who are willing

. reporting in the Newsletter and to Church meetings

. chairing planning meetings

The Fundraising Chair does not have to follow the pattern of previous Chairs, but can use their own imagination and enthusiasm to come up with ways to raise funds for charities and Church funds. Of course, the existing Fundraising Team remains willing to be involved.

As we are a small Church we don't elect representatives to a Church Council – every member may vote at a Church Meeting. By signing that you have attended a meeting you are agreeing to be treated as a Trustee. Trustees sign an annual declaration for the Charity Commission about conflicts of interest and legal disqualification. Some info goes on the Charity Commission website. Therefore, from time to time, it could be seen as helpful to remind Members of the duties of Trustees:

"The Five Golden Rules of being a Trustee

If you are a member of your Local Church Council, Circuit Meeting or any of the other Methodist bodies of Managing Trustees, then you are a charity trustee. This means that there are a number of duties placed on you under charity law. In England and Wales, the key piece of legislation is the Charities Act 2011.

Each Local Church, Circuit, District etc. is a charity in its own right. There are still some Local Churches and Circuits that are not registered with the Charity Commission because their annual income does not exceed £100,000. Such Methodist charities are excepted from registration by virtue of the Charities (Exception from Registration) Regulations 1996 until 31 March 2031. However, even as an excepted charity the Local Church or Circuit is a charity and must comply with charity law. As a starting point, please refer to the following five golden rules of being a charity trustee:

Charity trustees must always act:

(1) In the best interests of the charity – make balanced, adequately informed decisions; think about how the charity can best fulfil its purposes in the long term as well as short-term; avoid conflicts of interest and step aside from discussion and voting if they have a personal or financial interest.

(2) In accordance with the law and the charity's governing documents – comply with the charity's own governing documents e.g. Methodist Constitutional Practice and Discipline (CPD); comply with the law generally including charity law and other relevant laws (e.g. employment or property law) – please speak to the Legal and Constitutional Practice Team (LCP) and TMCP if you have any questions on your legal obligations; and take professional advice where necessary. Don't rely on word of mouth, assumptions, strong voices or past precedent. Don't bend the rules – there can be a tension between a charity's legal obligations and our Christian values. TMCP and LCP know that it is not easy at times for trustees to balance these obligations and values, but the law must prevail.

(**3**) With reasonable skill and care – give time, thought and energy to your role, prepare for meetings and attend meetings! Actively participate during and between meetings. Take professional advice

where necessary and ask questions. If something goes wrong, address it. Don't be afraid of admitting what may have gone wrong and getting help.

(4) Prudently and responsibly – look after the charity's assets responsibly. Ensure the charity properly takes account of the views of its members and beneficiaries, communicates well and guides the Local Church or Circuit etc. on the right path (in charity's best interests). It is the charity's money – spend it wisely. Be prepared to make difficult decisions.

(5) Collectively – ensure proper debate and that there is transparency/audit trail for decision making, no loose cannons! Once a decision is made, everyone must stand behind it. If a smaller group makes the decision on behalf of the charity, ensure there is a proper delegation in place with clear terms of reference. Agree and be clear about what decisions are not being delegated. The trustees need to be able to justify why/how a decision was made if questioned.

Trustee liability - Methodist charities are unincorporated which means that the charity trustees have unlimited liability. However, trustee indemnity insurance is generally available (£100,000 cover per trustee). NB. No insurance policy will protect you from fraud, reckless decisionmaking etc. But if you act within the rules and in good faith, you are likely to be protected. Charity trustees are volunteers. Even if the decision was a poor one in hindsight, if you can show you were acting in good faith and can evidence why you reached the decision in the way that you did in the circumstances, then you are likely to be protected." South Pond is said to be one of the jewels in the crown of Midhurst. As mentioned in previous articles South Pond is an important area being the second oldest structure in Midhurst, second only to St. Ann's Castle, and is enjoyed by so many of all ages for a variety of recreational purposes.

A little history part IV

In history part III the troubles which arose from the new work which commenced 2014/15 were mentioned.



After the gaps were created we had difficulty using our boat to cut back the growth on the top of the faggots which originally enclosed the area and which had been dug out to give the views requested.

An ongoing issue is the silting up of the passages between the islands. So, at

the dredging, all the silt was put on the newly created mud banks in the

hope that it would supress the sweet reed grass. We received low-growing plants to put in these mud banks. They were netted to protect them from the geese and ducks. That summer we had a period of drought so the fire brigade,

who came along for some practice, kindly watered them for us.



Unfortunately, the silt deposit didn't work and we are still trying to eradicate the sweet reed grass. We are slowly winning but we are not there yet. It produces an extensive network of underground roots and rhizomes that can reach one metre deep making it difficult to remove. A single plant is capable of producing up to 100 shoots and 30m of rhizome in its first two years of growth. Although a native plant, it is very invasive and was not the right choice by those making the original planting.

The reeds that were planted did not take a proper foothold on the south side as the water over the silt was too deep and although new plants were placed there on wooden rafts it is taking time for them to get established.

The Present

The pond can be beautiful at this time of year but whilst working down there one freezing morning we saw adults trying to step on the ice and they, and a child, fell in.

This winter it has also seen a lot of flooding which washes more silt down the stream into the pond. Before the birds start nesting in the spring CDC will be removing the silt again. It is very expensive to take it off site so it will be deposited around the pond edges.

on 11th May it is hoped that a Spring Fair will be held


on 19th May the Church Anniversary Lunch will take some form
