

Jesus said to them, 'come away by yourselves and rest a while'. (Mark 6:31).

It had been a particularly busy time. Mark tells us that the 12 disciples had returned from a trip around local towns and villages, preaching and healing. No doubt they were exhausted from that but there was no respite when they got back as many people were still coming and going.

It's possible that you know something of what that feels like. Maybe you get home from a busy day at work and there are still jobs to be done at home. Maybe it's been a busy week at work and the weekend is filled with visits – either you're going to friends or family or you've got people coming and you have to clean and tidy and shop and cook...

The past 17 months have not only been busy for some, they have also been very different and that can make it even more tiring. We've all had new patterns to get used to in terms of keeping a distance, wearing a mask, washing hands what seems like every 20 seconds and meeting on zoom rather than in person.

Jesus knows that life can be like that and he's concerned about it. Jesus said to them, 'come away by yourselves and rest a while'.

Sometimes we get refreshment by going on holiday or simply a day out by ourselves.

But notice that Jesus didn't say, 'go away and have a break'. He said, '*come* away ...'. It is explicit that for our complete refreshment – physical and mental and also spiritual - we need him to be with us. The regular pattern of the week includes 'Sabbath' – a restful time away with God. Not one day in every seven in church but taking time and space to allow God into your life to refresh you for what he asks you to do among your family, friends, colleagues and communities.

I pray that we all get some time away with Jesus to refresh.

Liberated!...but Cautious

You will no doubt be aware that the Government regulations about COVID changed on 19th July. Some things in Church will be different and some things will not change, for now.

The things that have changed:

- **Face coverings** will not be compulsory, but we urge you to continue using them in the building, for the sake of those around you and yourself. This is the recommendation of Methodist HQ
- At last, we can **sing the hymns** - even if that's behind a mask.
- We will be allowed to enjoy fellowship and **Coffee** after services.

Things that will not be changing, at least for now:

- **The register** will still need to be completed when you arrive.
- **Hand sanitisers** will still be available so please use them as you have been doing.
- **The offering plate** will still be on a table near the door – we will not be handing it around during the service. The offering will be dedicated during services but if you wish to add to it afterwards, there will still be a plate on the table by the door.
- For the time being **the chairs** will be left arranged at a distance from each other as we have got used to.
- Please bring and take away your own **hymn books** and **Bibles**, as books will not be given out – the words of the hymns will be on the screen.
- **Communion** will continue to be as we have been doing.
- **Handshakes and hugging** are discouraged and the Peace will not be as we might wish.
- We will endeavour to keep the Church **well-ventilated**, as we have been doing.

- And of course, the basic advice is still to **stay away if you feel unwell**.

Prayer Focus

If asked to lead the Prayers of Intercession for the Sunday morning service, most of us would run a mile. What to include? What to leave out? How we wish our use of English was better. Do not worry - we are not the only ones to experience difficulty in praying; even the disciples, who were in the presence of Jesus daily and would have been brought up to pray daily in the synagogue, had to ask Jesus to teach them how to pray. As a result, Jesus offered as a guideline the words we know today as The Lord's Prayer. Let us look at these words, line by line.

Firstly, 'Our Father', one who loves and cares for his family. Unfortunately, not everyone has fond memories of their mortal families, but Father God is the creator and provider of all we have and need.

The next words - 'Who art in Heaven, Hallowed be thy Name' acknowledge that God is ruler of Heaven and Earth and 'Hallowed' or 'Holy' can be translated as Unique, or that God is the only God.

'Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done, on earth as it is in Heaven'. These words could be the mission statement for all churches. If God's Kingdom were established here on earth, then prayers of petition would no longer be necessary as the petitions would all have been answered.

'Give us this day our daily bread,' - God will supply our needs as and when we require them. God is assuring us that there is sufficient for all, provided it is shared and distributed fairly.

'Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us.' If we are looking for our sins to be forgiven, then we should be prepared to forgive those who sin against us. This is often very difficult, as those in so many places are discovering at this time.

'Save us from the time of trial,' is asking for God's protection when we are tempted, 'and deliver us from evil, for the kingdom, the power and the glory are yours now and forever'. Amen

We could use this framework for our own prayers adding more personal items when there is something we really need to bring before God. Remember, we just have to be ourselves.

Finally, we should not forget to listen for answers to our prayers.

OUR COMFORT ZONE

Over the past hundreds of years there have been times when evangelism has made great strides. John Wesley brought about a huge change when he started his journeys around the country. He made ordinary people more aware of the love of God at a time when the Church of England was not doing its job very well.

Two World Wars caused some people to lose their faith but overall more people went to church because they wanted to pray for their loved ones and to feel the support of their church in those terrible times.

Before 1948 when poor people were living hand to mouth and didn't have a benefit system to fall back on, they took some comfort from the knowledge that God loved them and that they would eventually go to heaven.

Now most folk in this country have enough to eat, own a TV and probably a car. They are reasonably comfortable and don't need to think about whether they have a faith. Alongside that attitude the church has stopped working on evangelism and changed over to "outreach" which is a lot easier to carry out. It has its good and bad points and we could talk about that all night! I have heard people say on several occasions that all we can do nowadays is concentrate on looking after our own flock.

What would John Wesley say? That the flame had stopped burning? It is very hard to be a true Methodist in this comfortable country we live in now but we are about to face the biggest crisis this world has ever known. Climate change is proceeding much faster than was predicted. We have all seen the effects on TV. Over the next few years we are going to feel less comfortable as we have to give up things that we took for granted. Most of us will be worse off financially. We are going to have to support more people who are escaping from hot countries and people whose island homes have become submerged. With a pandemic which is going to be difficult to shake off, people will need faith in a loving God to sustain them. Can the Methodists rise to the challenge, be they ever so few in number, and take the good news out to the people regardless of their own comfort?

Café Church

The Leadership Team is aware that there is a need for a weekday meeting and has been discussing it for quite a while but our ideas and plans were delayed several times by lockdowns.

At last, all being well, Café Church will start on 1st September. It will meet at 10.30am on the first and third Wednesdays of the month, around the coffee tables in the Church.

The format will involve coffee (with continuous refills) cakes etc. Then prayers and a hymn followed by a reading or introduction to a theme - Christian, contemporary or secular. Next would be a discussion around the theme, altogether and/or in groups. The themes can come from various places eg the Methodist Prayer Handbook, commentaries or the lectionary. A summing-up and prayers of intercession will follow, finishing with a hymn or perhaps the Grace.

Our minister, David, will lead once a month with a couple of other leaders already recruited.

A Parable...

In a mother's womb were two babies. One asked the other: "Do you believe in life after delivery?" The other replied, "Why, of course. There has to be something after delivery. Maybe we are here to prepare ourselves for what we will be later."

"Nonsense," said the first. "There is no life after delivery. What kind of life would that be?"

The second said, "I don't know, but there will be more light than here. Maybe we will walk with our legs and eat from our mouths. Maybe we will have other senses that we can't understand now."

The first replied "That is absurd. Walking is impossible. And eating with our mouths? Ridiculous! The umbilical cord supplies nutrition and everything we need. But the umbilical cord is so short. Life after delivery is to be logically excluded."

The second insisted, "Well I think there is something and maybe it's different from it is here. Maybe we won't need this physical cord anymore."

The first replied, "Nonsense. And moreover, if there is life, then why has no one ever come back from there? Delivery is the end of life, and in the after-delivery there is nothing but darkness and silence and oblivion. It takes us nowhere."

"Well, I don't know," said the second, "but certainly we will meet Mother and she will take care of us."

The first replied "Mother? You actually believe in Mother? That's laughable. If Mother exists then where is She now?"

The second said, "She is all around us. We are surrounded by her. We are of Her. It is in Her that we live. Without Her, this world would not and could not exist."

Said the first: "Well I don't see Her, so it is only logical that She doesn't exist."

To which the second replied, "Sometimes, when you're in silence and you focus and listen, you can perceive Her presence, and you can hear Her loving voice, calling down from above."

Latest Information from Sanctuary in Chichester

Now that COVID restrictions have been easing for a while, SiC has been getting back to business.

To draw the attention of the public to Refugee Week in June, SiC joined with '[Children on the Edge](#)' to arrange an immersive exhibition for all ages, "You Cannot Walk Alone", offering insight into life of refugees both abroad and in our area and how they enrich the communities they journey to. This was at the [Revelation Church](#) in Chichester.

In collaboration with 'Article 12 Arts' and hosted by Chichester Cathedral, "Tears of Joy" was an exhibition **of artworks created by young asylum seekers and refugees across the Chichester District.**

The Drop-In Centre has reopened though with restricted activities but hopefully it will be fully operational very soon. The Nations United Football Team has restarted. There is a new scheme for teaching English.

Recently there was a change of Government contract, with inevitable teething problems, for refugees accessing the meagre benefits to which they are entitled. It was a time of great hardship for the recipients.

Friends Of Midhurst Common

Membership of The Friends of Midhurst Common has never been simpler – go to our website and complete the form. This year the annual fee is ZERO. Become more informed and involved to promote our Common as an ecological and biological resource and learn more about its history.

Murray has reported seeing or hearing a few bird species of interest: Bullfinches singing, Marsh Tits, Treecreepers, Green Woodpeckers and Nuthatches. Also, some plants: up to 700 Smooth Catsear flowers across the patch of rabbit-grazed lawn near the pond area – we plan to protect this area from invasion by other plant species which would ultimately take over completely. A colony of Wintergreen, just starting to flower, has been seen in the sandpit area.

Our Heathland maintenance work continues on the second Wednesday and fourth Friday of each month – COVID regulations allow groups of 6 people to work in the open air.

Why not take a look at the Bog Allotment off Bepton Road? Especially if you are interested in species that enjoy that particular environment. Finally, keep yourself informed about what you can see by visiting the new welcome board as you enter the Common past Carron Lane cemetery – photo attached

Computers for Primary Schools

With the country in lockdown, schools only partly open and operating in bubbles, it was largely impossible for Rotary to participate in their normal youth programmes during the past year.



Recognising that online communication was playing a greater part in everyone's life a project to assist primary schools in the area was born. Supported by a generous donation from the Roman Catholic Church Rotary has been able to provide 11 primary schools across the Midhurst & Petworth area with 50 computers, assisting staff and pupils to develop their online skills and their e-safety awareness, now an essential part of the school curriculum. With school budgets overstretched reaction from Head Teachers to Rotary's offer was enthusiastic, often stating how big a difference it was making to on-line learning with one reply saying that it was the best news they had received in a very long time. One surprise was that the schools are left to pursue their own programme for purchasing hardware, demonstrating that they are required to plan their own policies with regard to specification and how the computers are deployed.

Once the new computers were delivered it was not long before Rotary received pupil reaction with many letters of thanks from both staff and children delighted with their new acquisitions. A number of children spoke of frustration with the older models which were taking 10 minutes just to log on. From the tenor of the letters it was clear that, in lockdown, schooling has become much harder. Below is a picture of Midhurst Primary School pupils using their new computers.

Friends of Midhurst Common invite you to a guided local walk for MADhurst 10.30am until noon, 14th and 25th August 2021.

Come and join the Friends of Midhurst Common for a wonderful guided walk exploring the natural beauty of our local common with information about the plants, animals and historic places.

The guided walk passes 6 places of special interest which the walk leader will point out.

On the walk you will see evidence of how tree creepers keep warm on the coldest winter nights, visit the pesthouses, allotments and historic paddock. Spot rare plants, visit the ponds and consider the possibility of creating habitats for Sand Martins and Kingfishers. The walk will take you along the old railway line towards Bepton and pass trees where woodpeckers nest. At the top of Sunset Hill, you will be able to see the work the Friends of Midhurst Common have been doing to maintain the heathland.

The walks start at the Carron Lane carpark. There is no charge but there is a maximum of 15 people per walk and you must be aware of the Terms & Conditions. Please go to the MADhurst website to book your ticket or ask a steward.

Circuit Farewell Gathering 15th August

The end of August is a busy time for clergy in Methodist Circuits as so many staff move to new appointments.

Our Circuit is no exception. We are losing two presbyters and two deacons:

Rev John Mills is to take up a hospital chaplaincy

Rev Bill Stillwell is ‘sitting down’ ie retiring

Deacon Laura Evans and Deacon Janet Heys are moving on.

On Sunday 15th August there will be a gathering of the Circuit in the Queen Elizabeth Country Park, near Petersfield, to bid farewell to those who are leaving us. It will be in the afternoon, not before 2pm, though the time has not yet been confirmed. We will give you further information when it is available.

Setting New Records at the Riverbank Medical Centre

After more than five months of vaccinations, a whole host of achievements are being clocked up. These are against a backcloth of county-wide statistics. Midhurst has 2 out of Sussex's 45 vaccination centres. The County has now delivered 1.7 million vaccinations to 1 million people.

At Riverbank Medical Centre, the professional team of doctors, nurses, healthcare assistants, receptionists and managers have been supported by over 100 volunteers. This enlarged team has provided over 20,000 vaccinations not only to the over-50s but also to the 20-somethings.

To all those involved, it remains very rewarding. Initially older people were relieved to be out and in a tunnel with light at the end. Now we have younger people attending who are equally excited and committed to eliminating COVID-19.

The team anticipated a change of attitude as the risk/reward balance was perceived as being different. However, it is evident that young and old are united in their desire to develop a community resistance to the disease.

This is a welcome fillip to the volunteers as they balance their change of circumstances. People are returning to work, schools are back and holidays are available.

The bridge between the professional team and the volunteers, is managed by Practice Manager, Kath Miles, and lead Volunteer, Simon Flint. Together they have marshalled a volunteer team that has four different roles in helping patients either side of their vaccinations.

Simon says "I have really enjoyed pulling together such a committed and enthusiastic team. We all regret the circumstances but appreciate the opportunity to meet and make new friends." The team has been drawn from Rotary Club, Inner Wheel, Midhurst Sports Clubs (Tennis, Cricket and Rugby) and the South Harting community.
